Resolution 2024-08-Establishing Even Year Elections.

At a regular meeting of the City Council of St. Louis, Gratiot County, Michigan, held the 4th day of June, 2024 at City Hall Council Chambers, 300 North Mill Street, St. Louis, MI 48880 the following Resolution was offered by Upton and was supported by Leonard, and with the following members being present or absent:

WHEREAS, the City of St. Louis currently holds regular non-partisan City primary elections on the first Tuesday following the first Monday in August of each odd numbered year; and

WHEREAS, the City of St. Louis currently holds regular non-partisan City general elections on the first Tuesday following the first Monday in November of each odd numbered year; and

WHEREAS, the City of St. Louis wishes to change from odd year to even year regular City elections; and

WHEREAS, Section 642a(4) of the Michigan Election Law, MCL 168.642a(4), provides that a city may change primary and general elections from odd to even numbered years by adopting a resolution to such effect; and

WHEREAS, Section 644g of the Michigan Election Law, MCL 168.644g, provides that a term of office shall not be shortened by MCL 168.642a, and the term of an official who was elected before the effective date of the change continues until a successor is elected and qualified at the next regular election; and

WHEREAS, the City Council gave notice of a public hearing on this Resolution in a manner designed to reach the largest number of the City's qualified electors in a timely fashion; and

WHEREAS, the City Council held a public hearing on this Resolution immediately before considering the adoption of the Resolution;

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the City of St. Louis hereby changes its regular primary and general elections from odd to even numbered years.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the City of St. Louis shall hold regular non-partisan City primary elections on the first Tuesday following the first Monday in August of each even numbered year.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the City of St. Louis shall hold regular non-partisan City general elections on the first Tuesday following the first Monday in November of each even numbered year.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this resolution takes effect January 1, 2025, pursuant to MCL 168.642(7)(a)(ii) and MCL 168.642a(4).

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that, by operation of law, the term of office for certain officials may be extended as required by MCL 168.644g.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this Resolution shall be filed with the Michigan Secretary of State.

The following preamble and resolution were offered by Member Azzam and supported by Member

Upton:

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of St. Louis, County of Gratiot, State of Michigan,

pursuant to Act 33, Public Acts of Michigan, 1951, as amended, has created the St. Louis Fire and

Police Special Assessment District (the "District") to pay for certain costs and expenses of fire and

police motor vehicles, apparatus, equipment, housing and operations (the "Assessed Costs") and

assess the costs thereof to the property specially benefitted by said fire and police protection in the

District; and

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WHEREAS, a special assessment roll has been prepared for the purpose of defraying the Assessed Costs; and

WHEREAS, the City Council has reviewed said special assessment roll, and, after due and legal notice, the City Council met on June 4,2024 and heard objections to the distribution of the special assessment levy; and

WHEREAS, the City Council deems said special assessment roll and special assessment levy to be fair and equitable.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED THAT:

- 1. The special assessment roll attached hereto as Exhibit A shall be designated "St. Louis Fire and Police Special Assessment Roll" (the "Roll").
 - 2. The Roll, in the total sum of \$129,490.55 is hereby confirmed and approved.
- 3. The assessments made in the Roll are hereby ordered and directed to be collected and the City Treasurer is directed to distribute the special assessment levy on the taxable value of all of the lands and premises in the District.
- 4. The City Council shall annually determine the amount to be assessed in the District for fire and police motor vehicles, apparatus, equipment, housing and operations, shall direct the City Treasurer to distribute the special assessment levy, and shall hold a hearing on the estimated costs and expenses of fire and police protection and on the distribution of the levy. The assessment may be made either in a special assessment roll or in a column provided in the regular tax roll. The special assessment shall be distributed and shall become due and be collected at the same time as other City taxes are assessed, levied, and collected, and shall be returned in the same manner for nonpayment. If the collections received from the special assessment levied are, at any time, insufficient to meet the obligations or expenses incurred for fire and police motor vehicles, apparatus, equipment, housing and operations, the City Council may, by resolution, authorize the transfer or loan of sufficient money from the general fund of the City, to the special assessment fund. This money shall be repaid to the

general fund of the City out of special assessment funds when collected.

5. All resolutions and parts of resolutions insofar as they conflict with the provisions of this resolution be and the same hereby are rescinded.

WHEREAS, the City Manager has submitted and filed with the City Council a proposed budget estimating revenues and expenditures for 2024-2025 fiscal year, as required by Chapter VII, Section 7 of the City Charter and Act 2, Michigan Public Acts of 1968, as amended, and

WHEREAS, the City Council in accordance with Act 621 Michigan Public Acts of 1978, as amended, has set the date June 4, 2024 for a public hearing at 6:00 o'clock PM, or as soon thereafter as the agenda permits, to receive citizen comment on the proposed budget as presented herein. A copy of the affidavit of publication of said public hearing is on file with the City Clerk.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, the City Council, after such hearing thereon and consideration thereof, does hereby adopt said budget as represented herein and fixes the tax of fifteen (15) mills for general operating purposes (subject to Headlee rollbacks and adjusted to 13.0548 mills), to be raised by a general ad valorem tax upon owners of real and personal property in the City, by the authority granted, and in accordance with the Michigan Constitution, the General Property Tax Act 206, Michigan Public Acts of 1893, as amended, and City Charter, Chapter VII, subject to limitations therein.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the City Treasurer be authorized and directed to make such transfers between the various funds in accordance with the adoption of the budget as follows:

Resolution 2024-11 Board of Review Compensation.

The following preamble and resolution were offered by Member Palmer, and supported by Member Leonard:

WHEREAS, Ordinance No. B-131 was adopted into the Code of Ordinances by the St. Louis City Council on March 17th, 1999.

WHEREAS, Ordinance No. B-131 allows for the City Council to establish, from time to time, by resolution, the rates of compensation for each member of the Board of Review.

WHEREAS, the current rate of compensation is in the amount of \$100 per member for a full day session of Board of Review and research by City Staff has concluded this rate has been similar since May of 1993.

WHEREAS, the passage of time and inflationary effects indicate the rate is in need of adjustment to adequately compensate members of the Board of Review for the time taken away from other activities.

WHEREAS, an average annual inflation rate of 2.52% since 1993 yields the result of \$100 being approximately equivalent to \$216 at the current time.

WHEREAS, adjustment of compensation to an amount of \$216 per member for a full day session and \$108 per member for a half-day session has been deemed reasonable.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED the City Council hereby approves and establishes the rate of compensation for Board of Review members at \$216 per member for each full day session and \$108 per member for each half-day session.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, this rate of compensation shall be effective on the first meeting of the Board of Review following the adoption of this Resolution and shall remain in effect until such time as the City Council makes changes by adopting a subsequent resolution.

Member Upton stated she does not support the complete reappraisal.

Member Azzam stated he does not support the complete reappraisal.

Member Palmer made a motion to go forward with the complete reappraisal. No support was given.
